I. Call to Order

SDR Vice-Chair David Applegate called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

II. Approval of Minutes and Review of Actions

Members approved the September meeting minutes. All actions from the September meeting are complete.

III. Summary of Discussion

A. Report from the Vice-Chair

Dr. David Applegate reported that a draft charter has been prepared for the new Earth Observations Working Group, which will assume many of the responsibilities formerly held by the Earth Observations Task Group and the Remote Sensing Applications Working Group. All members of the previous two groups will be involved, and agencies who did not participate in the previous groups are welcome to send representatives as well.

Dr. Applegate invited Michael Hales from NOAA's Advisory Committee on Commercial Remote Sensing (ACCRES) to discuss the proposed 24-hour waiver for commercial high resolution satellite imagery. Normally, there is a 24-hour waiting period before high resolution satellite imagery is made available to non-federal government entities. The waiver would eliminate this waiting period and make imagery available to state and local governments, non-government organizations and international governments in the event of major disasters. ACCRES has asked SDR to provide recommendations about how to proceed with the waiver.

The next Disasters Roundtable, "Law, Science and Disaster," will be held on October 18th. The agenda was included in the meeting packets.

Dr. Applegate pointed out a publication from the Canadian Government that was submitted by the Department of Transportation and included in the meeting packets.

Meeting participants also were advised of a new bill, S. 1753, the Warning, Alert and Response Network Act, that was introduced last month in the Senate. The bill calls for a program office to be established within NOAA to develop a national warning network.

B. Report from the NSTC Liaison

Dr. Gene Whitney began by stating the Office of Science and Technology Policy would be tracking S. 1753. The Task Force on Effective Warnings has been dormant because a policy piece must be put into place. The main responsibility of the task force is to coordinate disaster warnings systems on all levels. Dr. Whitney stressed that the Task Force will not take away any agency's programs or projects, but is simply seeking to get everyone on the same page. The Science and Technology Policy Institute will soon make a recommendation as to how the Task Force on Effective Warnings should proceed based on the available technology and current policies. Once reconvened, a key piece of the Task Force work will be analyzing the social/behavioral aspects of warnings, namely how to motivate people to react.

Dr. Whitney also stated that he is putting together a list of comments from members on Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, but at this time the SDR has not been asked to compile a lessons learned document, as similar efforts are already underway with Frances Townsend assembling a report for the White House. State and local governments have been providing input for that report but there have been difficulties receiving the appropriate information from Texas, Mississippi, Louisiana, Florida and

North Carolina. Dr. Melba Crawford volunteered to get the appropriate information from Texas and Mr. Bruce Davis volunteered to get information from Mississippi.

Dr. Margaret Davidson asked if the rebuilding plans for Louisiana and Mississippi following Hurricane Katrina would make the states and localities more disaster resilient. Dr. Whitney said that FEMA dollars can help restore buildings and critical infrastructure to their previous state but cannot be used to improve the structures or facilities. There are simply no funds available for hardening communication or electrical systems. The locals are making all the decisions about how federal dollars are spent and most are not soliciting federal advice.

IV. The Next Big Disaster

In September Dr. Whitney asked the SDR to write scenarios about U.S. vulnerability to other disasters scenarios. Meeting packets include hurricane, earthquake and volcano scenarios. Tsunami and flood scenarios are still being written. These scenarios will be used to brief Dr. Marburger but will not be cleared documents. They are for internal SDR use only. Members may send comments about the hurricane, earthquake and volcano scenarios to the Secretariat by Friday, October 14.

Dr. Bill Hooke, Chair of the Disasters Roundtable, spoke to the SDR about Hurricanes Katrina and Rita and the Next Big Disaster scenarios. Hurricane Katrina was not the worst-case scenario for New Orleans or the country as a whole. Refineries could have been more damaged and the levees could have failed to a greater degree giving way to even more flooding and loss of life. The press is narrowly discussing warning and evacuation and very little about recovery. Discussions about preparedness are absent entirely. Evacuation and emergency response must be improved. More than anything, though, home (or school or hospitals) must be safer places to be during a hazard. That means that law enforcement must be present to prevent criminal activity and water and sewer systems should either be hardened or come back on-line more quickly. This will not be achieved overnight.

In the interim, the SDR can promote a "No Adverse Effects" policy. Meaning the country or a state or community can weather a hazard and still have homes and jobs after the event has passed. A hazard event should not mean the end to a way of life. Dr. Hooke pointed out that tiny compromises over time led to chaos in the face of disaster during Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. All policies prior to Hurricane Katrina favored a short-term approach.

SDR also must continue fostering a culture of responsibility and talking about disaster reduction in a way that people will listen.

The American Meteorological Society will host a forum on Hurricane Katrina on December 19-21. The key questions are:

- 1. Experts saw Katrina coming. Why did bad things happen?
- 2. What other big disasters are on the horizon? How can we effectively mitigate against them?
- 3. Discuss the 200 hours prior to the hurricane and the 200 hours following the hurricane from a warnings, jurisdictions, communications and information standpoint.
- 4. What assets can industry bring to bear for disaster reduction? Should they have a seat at the table?
